REVIEW:

- A. The Setting Galatians 2:1-10
- 1) After 14 years - seems to be the account in Acts 15 more so than the one in Acts 11.
 - 2) While the private meeting was going on, some came in (false brethren) by stealth to those outside
 - 3) There are those who fellowship with the body of Christ, but are not apart of the body of Christ.
 - 4) How do we protect ourselves from them?
 - a) Know they exist
 - b) Compare every teaching, principle, etc., to the word of God.
 - c) Love the truth more than anything!
- B. The Pattern Galatians 2:11-13
- 1) After Peter had been there for awhile and established a **PATTERN OF BEHAVIOR**
 - a) A group of men came from James and Jerusalem.
 - b) Their presence caused a change in Peter's behavior
 - c) The reason given for the change is **FEAR**
 - 2) Other's followed Peter's example, even Barnabas!

- 3) Why do people follow such behavior?
- 4) It is easier to follow bad behavior than to set the direction for good.

- C. The Confrontation. Galatians 2:14-16
- 1) Paul address Peter in front of all.
 - 2) The problem was with “them” but the address is to “him” (Peter.)
 - 3) All the Jews were guilty, so the confrontation of Peter was for the **BENEFIT** of all, not the **DISGRACE** of Peter.
 - 4) Paul points out Peter's behavior as different from his values, not his character from a Christian.
 - 5) Paul brings them back to faith, as the way they went was a departure from faith.
 - 6) Just because you see an action like Peter's doesn't mean you are the one to be Paul.
 - 7) Bold actions like Paul's or saying straight forward things, without the love of Paul or the purpose God gave to him, just makes you **MEAN** and **UNCARING**
 - 8) A peacemaker needs to be stern without **BEING HARSH**
 - 9) Colossians 3:15
